FR. RUDY'S REFLECTION:

As we come to the end of the Church's liturgical year, today's Gospel from Mark also draws our attention to the end times. Mark's community of Roman Christians was enduring severe persecution. They were faced with the threat of torture and execution, and it felt as if their world was ending. In this context, Mark offers a message of hope. Though his words might seem ominous at first, they are meant to assure us that God is in control, even when everything seems lost. Jesus reminds us that while "the sun will be darkened and the moon will not shed its light," God's promises will not fail. Faith is believing in things unseen, holding firm even when the path ahead is unclear. As St. Paul reminds us, "We walk by faith, not by sight." This is the conviction that God is at work in the world, even when we can't see it. Mark's message to his community, and to us, is that God's love and sovereignty are unshakeable. Even when everything else is uncertain, we can trust that God is with us.

Jesus uses the parable of the fig tree to emphasize this point. He says, "When its branch becomes tender and sprouts leaves, you know that summer is near." This image speaks to the coming of God's kingdom in a new way. Just as the destruction of the Temple in 70 AD marked a profound change, so too do the challenges we face today point to God's presence and promise of renewal. Everything we see—our possessions, our achievements, even our struggles—are temporary and will pass away. What endures is God's word, God's love, and God's promise of new life.

As we prepare for the feast of Christ the King next week, and then enter the season of Advent, we are called to reflect on the enduring hope that Christ brings. No one knows the exact day or hour of God's coming - "not the angels in heaven, nor the Son, but only the Father." We are invited to live each day with faith, hope, and readiness, trusting that God's timing is perfect. As we continue to navigate the uncertainties of life, let us hold fast to this hope, keeping faith and remaining prepared, trusting that God's greatness is at work in all things.
