FR. RUDY'S REFLECTION: A young boy stands at the edge of something extraordinary. Clad in a crisp white shirt and a gentle nervousness, he clasps his hands and takes a deep breath. His parents look on with tearful eyes, while grandparents and cousins fill the pews behind him. This is no ordinary day—it is his First Holy Communion. After months of preparation, he now stands ready to receive Jesus for the very first time in the Eucharist. As the priest gently places the Host on the boy's tongue, something sacred unfolds—an invisible grace descends upon him, witnessed not only by his family, but by Heaven itself. In the quiet center of it all, this child has been transformed—he is now a living tabernacle of Christ's presence.

This beautiful scene offers a glimpse into what we celebrate on the Solemnity of the Most Holy Body and Blood of Jesus Christ, also known as Corpus Christi. Established in the 13th century and made a universal feast by Pope Urban IV in 1264, this solemnity invites us to fix our hearts and minds on the Eucharist—the true Body and Blood, Soul and Divinity of Jesus Christ. The Eucharist is not a symbol. It is not a reenactment. It is not a metaphor. It is Jesus—alive, present, and poured out for us at every single Mass. The Church teaches us that at the consecration, the bread and wine become the Body and Blood of our Savior.

Corpus Christi also reminds us that the Body of Christ is not only found in the Eucharist, but also in the Church. Saint Paul writes that we, the faithful, are members of Christ's Body, with Jesus as the head. Each of us is connected—diverse, yet united—called to love, to serve, and to worship. When we receive the Eucharist, we are drawn deeper into that unity, into that divine communion with God and with each other.

And so, we return to that young boy, who now carries within him the mystery of Christ. What began as a tender family moment becomes something far greater: a reflection of the Church itself, renewed by the love of Christ in the Eucharist. Let us cherish that love and never take it for granted.
